

March is National Women's History Month, a time to study, observe and celebrate the vital role of women in American History. The celebration's origins go back to 1981 when Congress passed a public law authorizing and requesting the President to declare the week of March 7, 1982 as Women's History Week. The week designation continued for the next five years, until a petition by the National Women's History Project led to the designation of March 1987 as Women's History Month. Congressional resolutions and presidential proclamations since then have continued the designation for the month of March. 

Zoellner Arts Center presents **Traveling While Black in Sports: A Virtual Conversation with Pamella Jenkins, Delaware State University Women's Lacrosse Coach** on Friday March 31 from 1-2 PM.

On April 20, 2022 the Delaware State University women's lacrosse team was traveling back home from a tournament. While traveling through Georgia, their bus was stopped "under the pretext of a minor traffic violation," said Delaware State University president Tony Allen. During that stop, Liberty County Sheriff's deputies informed the team that their luggage would be searched for narcotics.

Head women's lacrosse coach Pamella Jenkins will share this story of *Traveling While Black in sports*. What can coaches do to help student athletes of color navigate the terrain of traveling for competition? What can white athletes do to be allies or co-conspirators? What are athletes of color to do when they are in other areas of the country participating in their sports?
